



Most Important Points Of 11th January in History

➤ **1569: First lottery launched in England.**

January 11 The first recorded lottery in England was drawn at St Paul's Cathedral in London. The first prize was £5,000, other prizes included silver plate, tapestries and high-quality linen cloth.

In 1559, England got a new Queen Elizabeth I. England had a monarchy system at that time. That is, the king and queen were the heads of the government.



➤ **1613: Mughal emperor Jahangir gave permission to East India Company to set up a factory in Surat.**

The company opened a factory in Surat 406 years ago on 11 January 1613 after getting permission from the Mughal emperor and started production. Quilts, mattresses and clothes were made in this factory. Jahangir gave permission to the company as per his special strategy. However, the company gradually expanded its business in India and even enslaved India.



➤ **1922: Insulin given to diabetic patients for the first time.**

January 11, 1922 - Insulin used for the first time to treat a diabetic patient. In January 1922, Leonard Thompson, a 14-year-old boy dying from type 1 diabetes, became the first person to receive an insulin injection.

Vovine insulin was first obtained from the pancreas of bulls. Then porcine insulin was obtained from the pancreas of pigs. Finally, the purest human insulin currently available was produced.





Most Important Points Of 11th January in History

➤ **2001: First ever Defence Agreement between India and Indonesia.**

Indo-Indonesia relations refer to the bilateral relations between India and Indonesia. India and Indonesia are neighbouring countries. India's Andaman and Nicobar Islands share a maritime border with Indonesia in the Andaman Sea. Relations between the two countries are also almost two thousand years old.

India considers Indonesia a key member of ASEAN. The two nations agreed to establish a strategic partnership.



➤ **1942: Japan captures Kuala Lumpur during World War II.**

In January 1942, Japan captured the Malay city of Kuala Lumpur during World War II. Japanese forces had invaded Malaya on December 8, 1941.

Their commander, General Yamashita, launched an aggressive attack that quickly demoralized and defeated Malaya's garrison of British, Indian and Australian troops.
